The McNeelys praised Hanna Center in a message to the Index-Tribune.

"Supporting the mental health hub adds to overall community health and wellness for youth and adults," they wrote. "We believe Executive Director Cameron Safarloo and Vice President of Health and Advocacy Leslie Antonelli Petersen are extremely capable changemakers who will make optimal use of our support."

Before the pandemic, the annual gala included honorees, and organizers decided to include them again moving forward. They are chosen based on their involvement with Hanna as a board member, donor or supporter in the community.

The McNeelys' support and generous spirit will be acknowledged throughout Hanna Center's 75th Anniversary Fundraising Gala, which Safarloo regards as especially significant.

"Our 75th anniversary is an opportunity to celebrate our beginnings as well as an occasion to look at Hanna's new vision and bright future," he said. "We are already successfully expanding our impact in the lives on not only students but also foster youth, community residents seeking mental health services or new recreation options and more."

Slated for 5 to 10 p.m. on the Hanna Center campus, the gala will begin with a cocktail hour at 5 p.m., followed by a program shortly after 6 p.m., a live auction at 7:15 p.m., and dancing and lounge activities at 8:20 p.m.

Park Avenue Catering in Cotati will provide food and beverages throughout the evening. During the cocktail hour, guests will be treated to passed appetizers and during the program, they will enjoy a three-course meal.

Anthony Trucks, a former foster youth who went on to play in the National Football League, will serve as the emcee and share his inspiring personal story.

"We will also hear from Hanna Center alumni through interviews and them sharing stories of resilience, triumph and growth," said Meredith Standing, vice president of marketing, communications and events for Hanna Center.

Singing auctioneer Shawna Ferris McNulty, who performed in the musical revue, "Beach Blanket Babylon," will join Trucks in the live auction (see sidebar).

"The evening will end with a performance by the deluxe party band, Hella Fitzgerald," Standing said. "From vintage jazz and blues to classic soul, funk, R&B, '90s hits and contemporary tunes, they promise an unforgettable night on the dance floor as we celebrate 75 years of changing lives."

The galas began in 2006 to celebrate Hanna Center and its programs as well as to introduce new supporters to its work and raise funds.

"Our galas have helped to introduce key people to Hanna who have gone on to be major donors, board members, great community supporters and more," Binder said.

She said that Hanna Center hopes to raise \$400,000 at this year's gala and will use the money for its programs, including residential, which provides transitional housing to foster youth; mental health services, through the <u>Community Mental Health Hub</u>; recreation, via summer camps and community sports; and <u>Hanna Institute</u>, which equips and empowers individuals and agencies to build resilience into their culture.

Binder said that sponsorships are the "backbone" of the gala fundraising.

"They provide critical funds and an opportunity to introduce new people to Hanna," she said.

Sponsorships range from \$1,000 to \$25,000. More information about sponsorships is available at <u>Gala 2024 — Hanna Center</u>.

"A \$2,500 sponsorship includes eight seats, allowing our supporters to bring friends, family and others they think might also be interested in our work," Binder said. "Sponsorships also provide a visual message: By supporting Hanna with a sponsorship, you are public demonstrating belief in our programs and our work."
