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FUNDING FOR MENTAL HEALTH IN SCHOOLS

HANNA CENTER RECEIVES FUNDING TO OFFER COUNSELING TO STUDENTS IN SONOMA VALLEY

This funding will provide us with the resources to accelerate our vision of growth by providing mental health support that is consistent, reliable, and geared toward fostering independence and resilience in youth.

In February, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors awarded Hanna Center \$575,000 to provide mental health counseling to students in Sonoma Valley through the end of 2024.

The contract includes mental health services and group and individual counseling for students. These services are to be provided in collaboration with the Sonoma Valley

Unified School District. This partnership is a key aspect of the initiative, demonstrating a comprehensive approach to student mental health.


The funding also includes a training component for students on issues like body image, eating disorders, peer crisis, and mental health first aid. This resource is one that Hanna Center hopes will be utilized by districts beyond Sonoma Valley through Hanna Institute.

Both Hanna Institute and the Mental Health Hub are instrumental in fulfilling the contract. Hanna Institute will train students through inperson and virtual sessions to accommodate all participants. The Hub will provide clinical staff at various school sites,

ensuring that the mental health services are delivered directly to the students.

The money received for the project is part of American Rescue Plan Funding (ARPA), which is overseen by the Sonoma County Human Services Department.

HANNA ACADEMY LAUNCHED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM



EXPANDING OUR IMPACT THROUGH GREATER PARTNERSHIP

Hanna Center's partner Hanna Academy, a coed, non-public high school, received approval from the California Department of Education to admit residential students in February.

The Academy's program is designed to provide high levels of care and education. With a student-to-staff ratio of one staff member to six students, they ensure individual attention and support. Together, our comprehensive programming extends beyond school hours and includes recreation and case management, fostering a well-rounded educational experience.

Offering a unique opportunity, the Academy's residential program creates a supportive environment for students to experience dorm

life, health, nutrition, and counseling. They will have a group living experience that fosters peer relationships and provides structured daily living activities.

Counseling and casework services are provided to manage stress, resolve conflicts, heal trauma, and improve interpersonal relationships. Sports and recreation programs are available to foster teamwork and physical fitness.

Hanna Academy is poised to further expand its impact serving students in need of special education services who struggle to succeed in traditional school settings due to behavioral challenges caused by childhood trauma, adversity, and emotional disturbances.



ABOUT HANNA ACADEMY

Hanna Academy provides students with a warm, supportive community committed to their success and individual needs. With a strong emphasis on personalized instruction and curriculum, the Academy fosters an inclusive and supportive culture. Students showcase their critical thinking, literacy, and application skills through a skills-based education approach, meeting academic and vocational standards.

We provide the tools, connections, encouragement, and everything inbetween to help our students and graduates be successful.

"There's a lot to know and a lot to learn for any young person looking for their first job," said Monica Edwards, Hanna Center's Vocational Coordinator. "We help our students find success not only in landing jobs but getting hired in fields that are of real interest to them."

Monica works with Hanna Center alumni and current students through the Vocational Program to help them identify possible career fields they're excited about via an assessment that factors in their interests, experience, and long-term goals. Then, everyone works one-on-one to create a resume, develop cover letters, and practice interviewing skills in person and

on the phone. She also assists younger students in matching up with internships in fields they are interested in exploring.

From Career Technical Education (CTE) classes at Hanna Academy—which is required coursework—to participation in the North Bay Trades Introduction Program (TIP), to vocational training, Hanna has created a funnel of support for students and participants to find success and financial stability in any career path of their choosing.

Whether students have the desire to pursue higher education or jump into the workforce, Hanna is here to give them the tools to succeed.

FRANCO LUCCHESI

A LEGACY OF GIVING



Franco is a first-generation Italian American; his parents migrated to the United States from Lucca in the late 1940s, settling in San Francisco in 1953. Franco's rich family ancestry includes a story from his greatgrandfather, who was left as an orphan at the local church.

"The church had a community service they provided - a sort of 'lazy Susan' that was a circular wheel built into the wall with baskets," says Franco. "Families who could not care for their babies would leave the children in the basket, roll the wheel so the infant would go into the warm interior, and then ring the bell. The nuns would know what that bell meant, and the child would be immediately retrieved. If a last name was not left with the baby, the nuns would give it the name that went with the town. In our case, my greatgrandfather was left in Lucca

so the nuns gave him the last name Lucchesi. This is how many of the last names in Italy came to be."

Franco's great-grandfather went on to have a prosperous and happy life and was always thankful for the church, which gave him a new start. A legacy of giving began, and the next generation of the Lucchesi family would continue to financially support organizations that provided services to children.

"My dad was a passionate supporter of Hanna, for as long as I can remember," says Franco.

"I don't know how he came to know of Hanna, but he was always very enthusiastic about donating to the organization." When Franco's father passed in 2005, he gladly picked up the baton and started giving to Hanna monthly, making him a Guardian Angel donor.

"Unlike info I receive from various other non-profits," he says, "the information I receive from Hanna, I actually enjoy reading. I'm also a big believer in the trades and I love that Hanna has built that component into the school's curriculum. Since I've learned more about their programs, I've given more. I know my money is well-spent."

And even though Franco has not yet visited Hanna's campus, he's happily arranged to give the organization 15 percent of his estate. "Now that I'm retired, I'd like to get more involved at Hanna. I'm looking forward to making the trip out there to see it all in person, sometime soon."
